State of the Village Address—Delivered by Village President Abruscato at the Annual Wheeling/Prospect Heights Chamber of Commerce function, February 9, 2010

For the Village of Wheeling 2009 was a challenging year, as it was throughout the region, the nation, and the world. We are all familiar with the current economic crisis, and I will not dwell on the topic today. The Board of Trustees has made many difficult choices over the past months, balancing our responsibility to provide municipal services with the need to be cautious stewards of public funds. I am confident that our decisions will serve the best interests of Wheeling's residents and businesses, and equally confident that our Village staff will successfully implement those decisions. The employees of the Village are tremendously skilled and dedicated, and we are grateful for the hard work they do to keep Wheeling safe and prosperous.

That being said, 2010 has begun with many positive signs. By now I imagine all of you are aware—perhaps from first-hand experience—of an exciting new addition to our Restaurant Row, the long-awaited Superdawg. And Superdawg is hardly the only new restaurant in town: the past months have seen the arrival of the House of Bread in Garden Fresh Plaza, Sugar Hills Bakery in Lynn Plaza, and Las Islas Marias on Dundee Road, and they are soon to be joined by Krystyna's Deli in Dunhurst Plaza and Jet's Pizza at Lexington Commons.

I have been an elected official of this Village for nearly 23 years, and it has been my experience that times of crisis are followed by times of growth. It is our responsibility to lay the groundwork now for the turnaround which is sure to come. The Village opened two new municipal facilities in 2009, and is now in the process of converting our old Village Hall into a renovated Police Department facility and building a new Fire Department headquarters on Milwaukee Avenue. We finished a major sewer and water main replacement project on Wolf Road, and we recently completed an overhaul of our Village website, adding features and making it more attractive and user-friendly. And of course I am proud to say we have a new Village Manager who combines fresh energy and enthusiasm with extensive municipal experience and deep roots in Wheeling. We expect great things from him. Finally, I should note that in the last year the board have been joined by two new faces, Trustees Ray Lang and Dave Vogel, both of whom have long played active roles in our community, and both of whom I commend for their service.

Surely the most important way for us to prepare for the future is to continue working closely with community organizations and with other units of local, state, and national government. The clearest example of this is of course our partnership with the City of Prospect Heights for the operation of Chicago Executive Airport, and I look forward to continuing to work with Mayor Vole in this regard. But there are many other examples. In 2009 the Village completed Phase I of the Buffalo Creek Streambank Stabilization Project, a project that was funded jointly by the Village and by grants from the Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning and the State of Illinois; the Village is grateful to State Representative Sidney Mathias for his assistance in securing this funding. We are now in the process of applying federal stimulus funds toward the replacement of the Hawthorne School Bridge, and will be using a block grant from the U.S. Department of Energy to install new energy-efficient street lighting.

The Village is now finalizing a partnership with our friends at the Park District and the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District for a major project at Heritage Park, which will provide improved flood control throughout our region. We also recently signed an innovative agreement with the Cook County Forest Preserve to conduct ecological restoration on underused Forest Preserve property south of the Westin; this venture will also provide recreational and educational opportunities for residents and visitors, and is already being described as a model for future partnerships. Our Town Center Advisory Committee—another cooperative venture with the Wheeling Park District—recently issued its findings and recommendations, which we will soon integrate into our Comprehensive Plan. This will provide a consistent vision to guide our pursuit of redevelopment in Wheeling's town center, including the former Wickes site.

Village staff is also helping Wheeling High School with its new STEM curriculum by encouraging local manufacturers to provide hands-on learning opportunities. This is a program of great educational and practical value to the community, and we are happy to lend our support. In an effort to ensure its long-term financial security and involve a broader portion of the community, our Senior Center is establishing an independent nonprofit foundation to raise funds. Anyone interested can contact them for further information. And we're working with the Convention and Visitors' Bureau on the "Dine Global Give Local" campaign, which celebrates Wheeling's diverse dining options while helping local families in need; this is also supported by the Wheeling-Prospect Heights Chamber of Commerce.

Don't Become a Victim!

Please be advised that Wheeling and the surrounding area has seen an increase in “ruse” burglaries. What is a ruse burglary? A ruse burglary occurs when a group of two or more criminals target homeowners by making contact through deception while a second criminal makes entry into the resident’s home with the intent to steal valuables. In many cases, the criminals have identified themselves as Village employees to gain the confidence of the victim(s). Who are usually the targets of ruse burglars? Senior citizens.

Here are two real life examples of Ruse Burglaries that have occurred in Wheeling:

- Offenders claiming to be with the Water Department entered the home of a senior citizen to check pipes. While one subject distracted the senior, the other went into the senior’s bedroom and stole cash and jewelry. Subjects left the scene in white minivan with lettering on the side.
- Offenders claiming to be with the Forestry Department stated they were at the residence to trim some trees in the backyard. While one subject distracted the senior, the other went inside and stole items from within. Subjects left scene in black truck.

Please remember to lock your doors and windows, whether you are in the house or outside. Do NOT let anyone into your home unless you know them personally or you initiated the contact. If the visitor claims to be from the Village, call the Village first at 847.459.2600 to verify, or simply call the Police Department at 847.459.2632, then press “0” to speak with an operator.

Watch out for your neighbors, especially your senior citizen neighbors. Be observant. Who is outside? Is the senior talking to someone on the property? Is there a second individual with the first, or close by? Does the senior appear to be upset or confused? While the conversation you are witnessing may be perfectly innocent, we ask that you take an extra minute or two to observe what is going on. Remember that these criminals will “case” the neighborhoods looking for seniors outside doing yard work, etc., so it doesn’t hurt to pay attention to multiple subjects in “work” vehicles driving or parked in the area. Safe Babies, Safe Place, Safe Haven



Effective January 1, 2010, House Bill 3925 extends the time a parent has to relinquish an unwanted, unharmed newborn to **30** days after birth from the previous time frame of 7 days after birth.

In Illinois, a parent who cannot care for their newborn, up to 30 days old, can legally hand the unharmed infant to a **staff member** at a fire station, police station or hospital and walk away, no questions asked. A packet of information is given to the parent. The baby is transported to a hospital for a check up, then placed with a pre-approved adoption agency.

Kitten Season is Here

Feral Feline Project, a not-for-profit organization, is dedicated to humanely reducing the outdoor cat population by applying TNR. Since Feral Feline Project opened its doors in the summer of 2007, we have successfully trapped, neutered and returned (TNR) 550 cats. Let’s keep those numbers rising and TNR a record number of cats for 2010. Millions of feral and domesticated cats are euthanized each year due to lack of shelter space and not being adoptable. TNR is a safe and humane way of limiting the litters of kittens born in the wild and reducing the population of feral cats. Did you know that one female could produce up to two or three litters of kittens a year?



TNR is very beneficial and simple. The colony of feral cats that you feed will get the altering, vaccinations and medical attention they need. They are returned back to you so you can continue to responsibly feed and enjoy their company. Our clinic re-opens for the season in March. Water Restriction Reminder

To better conserve water, a ban on non-essential water use takes effect May 15th through September 15th. Non-essential water use is prohibited during this time from 12 p.m. to 6 p.m. everyday. Types of non-essential water use include but are not limited to washing vehicles; pressure-washing streets, sidewalks, parking lots, paved areas or building exteriors; using hose for clean-up; and irrigation of lawns. For code enforcement, please contact Community Development at 847-459-2620. Thank you for conserving our resources.

Capital Improvement Projects

The **2010 Water Main Replacement Program** is scheduled for the Hollywood Ridge Subdivision. Construction is anticipated to begin in May, with a projected completion date in September. Residents that will be affected are those residing on the following streets: Beverly Drive, Pebble Drive and Wilshire Drive.

The **2010 Storm and Sanitary Sewer Replacement Programs** address repairs of damaged and/or failing sanitary and storm sewers. These improvements are provided if necessary in conjunction with the Water Main Replacement Program project.

The **2010 Sidewalk Removal and Replacement Program** will begin in late Spring/early Summer. Staff continues to compile a list of locations that qualify for this work. This year's budget for construction of this ongoing/annual project is \$125,000. If you feel that you have a public sidewalk that is in need of repair, please call the Capital Projects & Design Division at 847.279.6900 and give us your address and phone number and we will evaluate the sidewalk to see if it qualifies for replacement as funding becomes available.

The **Hawthorn School Bridge Replacement** project, which was slated for substantial completion by the end of 2009, was delayed until this Spring. A substantial amount of the work for this project was completed in 2009 with the exception of the following: 1) installation of poured-in-place Portland Cement concrete deck on bridge; 2) placement of Hot Mix Asphalt (HMA) surface course on the path, 3) removal of the old bridge, and 4) final restoration and planting. Work necessary to complete these final contract items is anticipated to begin in April to coincide with the reopening of asphalt plants.

Arbor Day 2010

What is Arbor Day? Arbor Day is an annual celebration of the function trees have in our daily lives, and promotes tree planting and care. It is celebrated in Illinois on the last Friday in April. This year Arbor Day will occur on Friday, April 30th. The Village of Wheeling has received the Tree City USA recognition—which acknowledges the Village's forestry program—for twenty consecutive years and the Tree City USA Growth Award for eight consecutive years. By celebrating Arbor Day, the Village continues to demonstrate its awareness of the environment.

Annual Hydrant Flushing

The Village of Wheeling's Utility Division will be flushing hydrants throughout the Village during the months of April and May. During these months hydrant flushing will occur between the hours of 6 a.m. and 3 p.m., weather permitting, and will continue until all the portions of the water distribution system are completed. Signs will be posted throughout the Village while hydrant flushing is underway.

Flushing is an important preventative maintenance process and is undertaken to remove particulate matter and corrosion from the system. Residents may notice slightly lower pressure and discoloration of their water throughout the duration of the program; however, the water will be completely safe to drink. Residents are advised to check the color of the water before beginning laundry to prevent any staining.

Should any resident have concerns regarding the flushing program, they may contact the Department of Public Works Utility Division at 847.279.6900.

Yard Waste Collections



Yard waste, or landscape, collections will begin on April 1st and continue through November 30th

Single-family residents are reminded that yard waste must be placed in biodegradable 2-ply Kraft paper bags or in a container clearly marked with a red "X" around the body of the container. Bags and containers must not be larger than 33 gallons and must not exceed 45 pounds in weight. There is no limit to the number of bags or containers. Yard waste in plastic bags or cardboard boxes will not be collected. Townhome units and condominiums are not provided with yard waste services. All yard waste must be placed at the curb for collection by 6 a.m. the day of scheduled collection but not before 5 p.m. the evening before scheduled collections.

Brush must be bundled and tied with biodegradable twine or string. Bundles must not weigh over 45 lbs, not exceed 4 feet in length, not exceed 2 feet in diameter, and not contain limbs greater than 3 inches in diameter. There is no limit to the number of bundled brush.

2010 Census!

IT'S IN OUR HANDS

In order to achieve an accurate assessment of the number and location of people living within the nation's borders, the U.S. Constitution mandates a census of the population every 10 years. This year the goal of the Village of Wheeling is to count everybody, count them only once, and count them in the right place on April 1st. 2010 Census data will

directly affect how more than \$4 trillion is allocated to local, state and tribal governments over the next 10 years.

The facts gathered in the census also help shape decisions made in Wheeling and nationally for the rest of the decade about public health, neighborhood improvements, transportation, education, senior services and much more. To help ensure that the nation's increasingly diverse population can answer the questionnaire accurately and completely, about 13 million bilingual Spanish/English forms will be mailed to housing units in neighborhoods identified as requiring high levels of Spanish assistance. Additionally, questionnaires in Spanish, Chinese (Simplified), Korean, Vietnamese and Russian as well as language guides in 59 languages will be available on request. We will have Questionnaire Assistance Centers and Be Counted Centers throughout town to encourage everyone to be counted! With one of the shortest questionnaires in history, the 2010 Census asks for name, gender, age, race, ethnicity, relationship, and whether you own or rent your home. It takes only about 10 minutes for the average household to complete. Responses to the 2010 Census questionnaire are required by law.
