From the Desk of President Horcher


Warm weather is finally making its way to Wheeling, and as always it brings not only opportunities for outdoor recreation, but also progress on a number of notable construction projects.

The redevelopment of the former Deerfield Moving & Storage site on North Wolf Road into Wolf Crossing, a 39-unit townhome project, is now well underway. Developer DR Horton began work in February and expects to finish prior to the end of the year. See a rendering of the project to the right of this text. Progress also continues on Wheeling Town



Center, much of it behind the scenes. The Village has completed the transfer of the majority of the subdivided lots to the developer—including the future sites of Inland Bank, the drive-through Starbucks, City Works Eatery & Pour House, and the CMX Theater—and we're maintaining our collaborative engagement with this major project's many stakeholders. The residential portion of the mixed-use development is nearly under roof, and recruitment of tenants for the remaining retail spaces is ongoing. At press time, the Village is very close to concluding its negotiations on a redevelopment agreement with DAC Development regarding Uptown 500, their proposed mixed-use project at the northwest corner of Dundee Road and Northgate Parkway; the development will include 321 apartments and 10,000 square feet of retail space.

Growth continues at Chicago Executive Airport, as well. On April 5, I and other Village representatives attended a groundbreaking ceremony for the first of two new Hawthorne Aviation hangars, a 32,760-square-foot facility that will also include office space. The Village remains strongly committed to the prosperity of the Airport—which we co-own with the City of Prospect Heights—as well as the area around it. To help foster business growth and expansion, we're planning a \$1.1 million project to add new water and sewer infrastructure on Industrial Lane, with construction expected later this year. Other noteworthy capital projects scheduled for the coming months include roadway improvements, fire station renovations, and ongoing progress on stormwater control, including flood prevention in East Dunhurst and on Wheeling Road; the Village's efforts to install streetlights on the full length of Dundee Road will also soon be complete. It's worth remembering that our infrastructure is both physical and electronic: on Page 10 of this newsletter you'll find information about AquaHawk Alerting, a free service to help our residents and businesses keep track of their water usage.

One last milestone that's worthy of mentioning is the removal of the remaining structures from the former site of the Fox Point mobile home community on South Milwaukee Avenue, which the Village accomplished earlier this year. Most of the site lies in the floodway of the Des Plaines River, and over the years the park's residents experienced repeated severe floods, most notably in April of 2013. Using federal grant funds administered by Cook County, the Village purchased the property, provided relocation assistance for the residents, and cleared away the onsite structures, and is now in the process of converting the site into open space. This has been a long and challenging undertaking, particularly for the affected families, and the Village is glad to have been able to help them secure permanent housing free from the fear of repetitive flood loss.

POLICE & FIRE DEPARTMENTS

Keeping Spring Clean-up Safe

The time for spring cleaning can also bring the unexpected risk of fire and injury if proper precautions are not taken. By following some basic safety tips, you can help to keep your home or business safe from fire and avoid serious injury.

•**Fueling Lawnmowers:** Do not service lawnmowers, snow blowers, or motorcycles in a basement; only service these items outdoors and away from open flames and heat-producing appliances. Gasoline vapors are heavier than air and can be ignited by pilot lights on water heaters and clothes dryers. Old gasoline should never be poured down sewers or drains, since it can result in a serious fire/explosion hazard to both your home or nearby homes or businesses, as well as to Village employees who have to maintain the sewer system. Old gasoline can be easily disposed of by pouring it into the fuel tank of your personal vehicle, even if it is mixed with a small amount of oil.

•**Power Washing:** When cleaning outside with power washers or running water, make sure all outside electrical appliances are protected and shut off. If in doubt, turn off the associated circuit breaker before beginning your project.

•**Ladder Work:** When working outside on ladders, make sure the ladder is straight and firmly in contact with the ground to avoid falling. Never stand on the top rung/step since it can place the ladder out of balance and result in a serious life-threatening fall. Use extreme caution when painting, cleaning, or pruning shrubs, hedges, and trees around electrical service lines, and keep aluminum ladders a minimum of three feet away to avoid electrocution!

•**Landscape Trimming:** When trimming shrubs, hedges, and trees, make sure all appropriate equipment guards are in place, wear appropriate safety equipment for eyes, head, and ears, and keep children and pets far away. Avoid standing on ladders when using power trimmers or chainsaws.

•**Smoke Detectors:** Vacuum all smoke detectors and fire sprinkler heads. Do not paint over smoke detectors and fire sprinkler heads since it can delay or prevent the operation of these important fire safety tools. If your smoke detector is more than 10 years old—or if you don't know how old it is—replace it with a new one. If your smoke detector is battery-operated, change your smoke detector batteries, too!

•**Fire Extinguishers:** Check the pressure gauges on your fire extinguishers. If a gauge is not showing proper pressure, have it professionally serviced or replaced. Wheeling businesses are required to annually have all fire extinguishers professionally serviced. If you need to buy a fire extinguisher, purchase units with an A, B, or C rating since they can safely be used on a wide variety of fires.

•**Home Identification:** Make sure your address numbers are clearly visible both day and night and are not blocked by new growth from nearby shrubs, hedges, and/or trees.

•**Fire Hydrants:** If a fire hydrant is in front of your home or business, please keep all landscaping a minimum of 15 feet away from the front and sides of the fire hydrant. Hidden hydrants result in delayed fire suppression and create additional risk to you, your family, your business, and neighbors.

•**Storm Sewers:** If a storm sewer is located in front of your home or business, please keep all landscaping debris off of the top grate. Failure to do so can cause heavy summer rains to not properly drain, subjecting your home or business to flooding.

Summer Bike Rodeos



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Wheeling Wildlife Tips

The Village of Wheeling has an abundance of wildlife, and in most instances, people and wildlife can coexist. It is not uncommon for raccoons, skunks, coyotes, rabbits, and waterfowl to travel the neighborhoods at night. It is



also not uncommon to encounter wildlife in your yard or while you are out walking through the village. Changes in habitat and the different seasons will cause fluctuations in wildlife population and travel.

Guidelines for wildlife encounters:

- Please do not feed wildlife
- Do not handle orphaned offspring or sick wildlife
- Do not try to approach or corner wildlife
- Secure all trash in garbage cans with the lid closed tightly

Feeding wild animals will cause them to discontinue foraging, making them dependent on human interaction. Further, human food is not appropriate nutrition for wild animals: it can cause them to become sick and sometimes starve to death. Lastly, wildlife may become unafraid of humans, increasing the risk of inappropriate human and wildlife contact.

Remedies for wildlife control:

- **Grubs:** Removing this food source should deter the presence of feeding wildlife. Try Murphy's Oil or dish detergent mixed with water in a spray bottle. Spray over grub-infested areas.
- **Ground burrows:** Ammonia-soaked rags work well to vacate an unwanted visitor. Soak the rags and toss them in the burrow. Once the animal has vacated, pound rebar into the ground by the entrance and fill in the hole to prevent rehabilitation.
- **Raccoons in attics:** Keeping a light and radio running for days will do the trick to vacate unwanted wildlife in the attic. Repairs to openings must be made to discourage new infestations.
- **Animals in yard:** The Scarecrow is an automatic sensory sprinkler that attaches to a regular garden hose. It detects movement and sends out a blast of water, scaring away all wildlife, including feral cats.

In Cook County, the law states that if you feed feral cats, you are required to trap, neuter, and return (TNR) them. For more information on TNR, please contact Community Development at 847.459.2620.

Do You Need a Permit?

Before you build or remodel structures within the Village, it is likely you will need to obtain a permit. The Building Division is involved from the plan review process through the final onsite inspection to make sure building and remodeling projects comply with current life-safety building codes. Permit forms are available on the Village's website. If you are unsure whether you are required to have a permit for work on your property, please inquire through Community Development at 847.459.2620.

Watering Restrictions

To further water conservation efforts, the Village of Wheeling has implemented an even-odd address watering restriction in effect May 15 through September 15.

- Residents with street addresses that end with an even number (0, 2, 4, 6, and 8) can only water on even-numbered calendar days.
- Residents with street addresses that end with an odd number (1, 3, 5, 7, and 9) can only water on odd-numbered calendar days.
- Watering is prohibited for all properties from 12 p.m. to 6 p.m. every day.

The watering of newly laid sod is permitted at any time and on any day upon the issuance of an appropriate permit and for a time not to exceed two consecutive weeks.

Residential One-Day Electronic Recycling & Document Destruction Event

On Saturday, May 5, the Village of Wheeling is hosting a combined recycling event at Public Works, 77 W. Hintz Road, from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. only. Delays and longer waiting times are expected during the event. **It is recommended that you arrive no later than 11 a.m. to ensure participation.** Residents from Wheeling and other Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County (SWANCC) communities are eligible to participate. *Materials will not be accepted from businesses, schools or institutions, or non-SWANCC residents. ID's will be checked and those residents not from a SWANCC community will be directed to an exit.*

Electronic Recycling

Acceptable electronic items include answering machines, cable receivers, calculators, camcorders, cameras, cell phones, computer cables, computer monitors, computers (desktop, notebook, tablet), converter boxes, copy machines, fax machines, microwaves, mice, keyboards, MP3 players, portable digital assistants (PDAs), power tools and cords, printers, satellite receivers, scanners, shredders, small home appliances (toasters, blenders, etc.), stereo equipment (no wood), landline telephones, televisions (no wood), typewriters, video game consoles, video recorders/players and zip drives.

Items not on the acceptable electronic list (such as dehumidifiers, humidifier, air conditioners, vacuums, refrigerators, large home appliances, batteries, light bulbs, etc.) will be returned to the resident. Residents will then be responsible for proper disposal by contacting the Village of Wheeling or Waste Management for proper disposal requirements.

Document Destruction

For document destruction, residents may bring residentially generated paper such as medical records, tax forms, bank statements, etc. for shredding. There is a limit of six file-size boxes or paper bags per vehicle. No plastic bags. **Papers must be free of contamination such as metal clips, plastic sleeves, folders, and binders.** Documents will be placed in a toter and, once toters are full, loaded into a shredding truck onsite. The paper will be cross-shredded, baled and recycled. Due to safety concerns, the number of vehicles, and space constraints at this event, you will not be allowed to exit your vehicle for any reason or park to observe documents being shredded.

Parkway Tree Planting

The Village of Wheeling, through contractor Pugsley and La Haie Ltd., will be planting parkway trees in May and June, weather permitting. Through this program, and to maintain a diverse urban forest, a variety of species have been selected for planting.

Newly planted parkway trees will receive a Treegator water bag that will assist residents in watering the tree and promoting its growth. Watering is key to a new tree's survival, and it is especially important to keep newly planted trees watered for the first year after planting.

Treegator water bags hold approximately 15 gallons of water and release water through small holes that slowly drain the bag within five to nine hours. Residents will need to fill the Treegator water bag with water once a week throughout spring and summer, and should remove the bag in autumn.



Annual Water Report

The Consumer Confidence Report (CCR), also called the annual water report, is a document that provides consumers information about the source and quality of their local drinking water. According to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency Consumer Confidence Report Rule, every community water supplier must provide an annual report by July 1 of each year for the previous year's information. The CCR summarizes chemical and bacteriological contaminants, regulation compliances, educational health information, and water system contact information. The CCR can be found at:

Annual Hydrant Flushing



The Village of Wheeling Utility Division will be flushing hydrants throughout the Village from April 29 through May 14, weather permitting. During this time, hydrant flushing will occur between the hours of 7 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. and will continue until all portions of the water distribution system have been completed. Signs will be posted throughout the Village while hydrant flushing is underway.

Flushing is an important preventative maintenance process and is undertaken to remove particulate matter and corrosion from the system. Residents may notice slightly lower pressure and discoloration of their water throughout the duration of the program; however, the water will be completely safe to drink. Residents are advised to check the color of the water before beginning laundry to prevent any staining.

The Village of Wheeling has implemented AquaHawk Alerting, a free web-based application that enables residents and businesses to easily keep track of their water usage.

A particularly useful feature of the AquaHawk system is its ability to send alerts when it detects unusual increases in water usage, potentially alerting users to leaks before they become costly. AquaHawk provides users with flexibility in determining how often and under what circumstances they receive alerts.

The Village encourages all residents, businesses, and organizations that receive a water bill from the Village to register with AquaHawk at <https://wheelil.aquahawk.us/>

Registration requires the user's service address, contact information, and water billing account number. Account numbers can be found on users' water bills, or can be provided by Finance Department staff.
