Our Economic Development Department is relentless in recruiting new investment and development. This year we've been fortunate enough to welcome businesses such as Family Video, Great Clips, Fannie May and Lettuce Entertain You's new Italian restaurant, Saranello's, just to name a few. The long-anticipated Fresh Farms shopping center also celebrated its grand opening in 2011 and is experiencing much success.

Lastly, congratulations to the D'Agostino family for their upcoming restaurant opening on Milwaukee Avenue. The D'Agostino's recently purchased the former Hackney's restaurant building and will open for business in the coming months once their rehabilitation work is completed. Wheeling was chosen as their fifth and latest restaurant opening location, and updates on their opening date will be made available as renovation plans progress.

Unfortunately, even with the attainment of new businesses, the continued weakness in the economy is making this a difficult time for the Village of Wheeling, and we acknowledge that this is a difficult time for our residents as well. During the annual budget discussion, Staff and the Board made cuts to reduce a projected nearly \$3 million deficit to just under \$1 million. This was done with no increase to the tax levy, no creation of new taxes, and no increase to Village fees.

I am continually impressed with our Village's achievements, and look forward every year to remembering all that we have to be proud of. I am eagerly anticipating continued success for Wheeling and its residents in 2012.



Wheeling Board of Health Activities for 2012

This year's Community Blood Drives will be held on March 14th, July 11th and November 14th from 2:00 p.m. until 7:00 p.m. The blood drives are held on the first floor of Village Hall. Please come in and donate. One hundred and thirty units of blood were collected at Wheeling Blood Drives in 2011, which represent 390 lives saved! Thank you to all the residents who donated!



The Prescription Medication Collection will continue to be held on the third Saturday of every month from 10:00 a.m. until 12:00 p.m. in front of the Police Station at 1 Community Blvd. We accept prescription and over-the-counter medications in their original containers. We cannot accept any controlled substances such as Oxycontin and Percocet. We accept sharps (needles & syringes) in rigid containers with a sealed lid. We cannot accept sharps that are not in a rigid container. Sharps containers are available through the Community Development Department, located at 2 Community Blvd. You can also get a new container when you drop off your full one.

Batteries are also accepted during the Medication Collection. Residents may recycle household batteries (AA, AAA, C, D, 9V) and rechargeable batteries (Lithium NiMh, NiCad). No automotive batteries will be accepted. Each rechargeable battery must have masking tape on contact points or be contained in an individual self-locking plastic bag.

The Health Fair & Open House will be held on Saturday, October 20th. Mark your calendars! The last Health Fair was very successful and we look forward to providing more health services and information to the residents.

They're Coming to Get You!

A bit dramatic? Yes, but sometimes drama gets people's attention. A particular crime has seen a great increase in frequency in this area, and you need to be informed. It isn't a gang crime, and it isn't a violent crime, but it is a type of property crime that is gaining momentum.

Ruse burglaries are on the rise and are becoming more frequent every day. Ruse burglary involves someone who comes to your door and uses a "ruse" to trick you into letting them into your home. Typically they claim to be with the village, or perhaps related to one of your neighbors, etc. They may say they have to check your water supply, your property line, or any other myriad reason to get into your house or onto your property. Oftentimes they will be speaking on a phone to an accomplice, possibly in a foreign language. While one person distracts you with questions about the utilities, your fence, etc., a second person enters your home through an unlocked door. Where do you think they go from there? Correct: Your bedroom. And why do they go there? Well, it's not for your favorite bathrobe. It's for your jewelry and/or cash. People are creatures of habit, and will leave all of those items within easy reach—easy reach for both the homeowner and for the burglary offender who has only a few minutes to devote to searching for your valuables. Your bedroom represents the jackpot.

Who are these criminals targeting? For the most part they target senior citizens, but all residents need to be on alert. One victim in Wheeling suffered losses of over \$50,000 when the ruse was successfully played on her.

What can you do? First of all, the Wheeling Police Department recommends that you don't let anyone into your home unless you personally know who they are, or you initiated the contact with the company they claim to represent. (Example: you called Comcast Cable because your cable is out, and someone from Comcast shows up at your door that day. You can be reasonably sure it's not a coincidence.)

These criminals are merciless in their pursuit of other people's jewelry and hard-earned cash. The police can't be everywhere, and this crime won't stop without public education. Help us in that endeavor by getting the word out to all the seniors you know and care about. If you sense that you may have a ruse burglar in your neighborhood, please call 847.459.2632 or 9-1-1 immediately.

Safe Babies, Safe Place, Safe Haven

Effective January 1, 2010, House Bill 3925 extended the time a parent has to relinquish an unwanted, unharmed newborn to 30 days after birth from the previous timeframe of 7 days after birth. In Illinois, a parent who cannot care for their newborn, up to 30 days old, can legally hand the unharmed infant to a staff member at a fire station, police station or hospital and walk away—no questions asked. A packet of information is given to the parent, and the baby is transported to a hospital for a check-up. The baby is then placed with a pre-approved adoption agency. Wheeling Special Needs Resident List

The Village of Wheeling Special Needs Resident Notification (Illinois Premise Alert Program Public Act 96-0788) is now available. The Illinois Premise Alert allows people with special needs to provide information to police, fire, and EMS personnel to be kept in a database. This information will be provided to responders dealing with situations involving the special needs individuals.

To let emergency personnel know about you or your family members' special needs, pick up a form at the Wheeling Police Department or Wheeling Pavilion Senior Center. Forms may be completed on site or you may send them to the Wheeling Police Department at 1 Community Boulevard, Wheeling, IL. Your information will not be shared with anyone outside of the emergency personnel of the Village of Wheeling and any other agency needed to provide emergency response. The information provided on the list will not result in preferential treatment or change the response of trained emergency personnel. Inclusion on the list will result in emergency responders being better prepared to assist the individual residents with special needs.

Protect Water Lines From Freezing

Water expands as it freezes, placing great pressure on anything that contains it, such as metal or plastic pipes. Expanding water can cause pipes in basements, crawlspaces, attics, garages, and kitchen cabinets to rupture. Pipes running against exterior walls with little or no insulation are also vulnerable to freezing.

Residents can take measures to protect water lines from freezing and prevent water pipes from rupturing in homes during extreme cold conditions.

- If going away during the cold months, keep home temperatures no lower than 55F.
- Allow cold water to drip or trickle through faucets. Dripping water prevents pipes from freezing since the temperature of the water running through is above freezing.
- Open cabinets and closets that contain water lines to allow warm air to circulate around plumbing.
- Consider installing pipe insulations.
- Check pipe insulation periodically to make sure it is dry.
- Seal cracks in doors, windows and foundations. Small openings that consistently bring in cold air can quickly freeze pipes.

If residents know that a property has been unoccupied for several days, Public Works requests that you contact the Utility Division at 847.279.6900 to verify that water services are shut off at the property. This can prevent costly damage to the unoccupied property.



Holiday Tree Collections

Non-artificial holiday trees are collected at residential curbsides during the **first two weeks in January** of each year at no additional charge. All decorations, stands, etc. must be removed from trees. Please do not place trees in plastic bags. Trees that have decorations or are in stands or plastic bags will not be collected.

Capital Improvement Projects

The annual **Motor Fuel Tax (MFT) Street Improvement Program** is an integral part of the Village's Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) for renovating and improving streets throughout the community. There will be a program completed in 2012, but the location and extent of the improvements (reconstruction vs. resurfacing) is yet to be determined and will be dependent upon funding.

The **2012 MFT Sidewalk Removal and Replacement Program** will begin in late spring/early summer. Staff continues to compile a list of locations that qualify for this work. If residents have a public sidewalk that is in need of repair, please contact the Capital Projects & Design Division at 847.279.6900 and provide us with an address and phone number. We will evaluate the sidewalk to see if it qualifies for replacement as funding becomes available.

The **2012 MFT Crack Sealing Program** will begin in late spring/early summer. Sealing of cracks and joints in pavements has proven to be beneficial in extending the life of pavements. Quantities and specifications for the 2012 Crack Sealing Program will be finalized in January for an anticipated February/March bid opening.

The **2012 Sewer Lining Program** will begin in late spring/early summer. This ongoing annual maintenance program provides for the lining of specific segments of defective sanitary and storm sewer pipes. Sewer Lining Program details for 2012 will be finalized in January for an anticipated February/March bid opening.

The Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) is on schedule to replace the Wolf Road Bridge over Palatine Road, provided funding is available. The project may start as early as Spring 2012 with project completion slated for September 30, 2012.

Holiday Lights Recycling

Through the Holiday Lights Recycling Program, sponsored by the Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County (SWANCC) and Elgin Recycling, residents can recycle all holiday lights—mini-lights, C7 lights, C9 lights, rope lights, LED lights and extension cords—of all colors and lengths at the Department of Public Works, 77 W. Hintz Road, Monday through Friday from 7:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Garland, live greens, wreaths and other non-recyclables are not accepted in this recycling program. Residents may contact 847.279.6900 with any questions. The program concludes February 28, 2012.

Senior Ride Free & Reduced Fare RTA Passes

New legislation now requires seniors to enroll in the Circuit Breaker program in order to participate in the Senior Ride Free Program. The Senior Ride Free Program allows individuals 65 and older to ride at no cost on Metra, Pace and the Chicago Transit Authority (CTA) on fixed transit routes. The Regional Transportation Authority (RTA) has worked with the Illinois Department on Aging to identify all individuals who are currently on the Circuit Breaker program. Those verified on the Circuit Breaker program should have received a new free fare permit. Those who are not currently enrolled in the Circuit Breaker program or who simply do not qualify for the program due to their income will no longer be able to ride for free; they will be required to pay a reduced fare and will receive a new reduced fare card. There are no changes to the Disabilities Ride Free Program. Seniors who wish to apply for the Circuit Breaker Program can visit www.cbrx.il.gov or schedule an appointment with a Social Services Division staff member at 847.459.2670. Applications for the 2011 tax year will be available in late January or early February and can be filled out until December 31, 2012. The Wheeling Pavilion Senior Center will continue to be an RTA site and will continue to accept applications for new participants. Please contact the Wheeling Pavilion Senior Center at 847.459.2670 with questions and for qualifications on the Circuit Breaker Program or enrollment in the Senior Ride Free Program.

Senior Health Insurance Program (SHIP)

Are you puzzled by Medicare and don't know who to ask? SHIP can help. SHIP (Senior Health Insurance Program) is a free counseling service provided by the Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulation, Division of Insurance. SHIP does not sell or solicit insurance. SHIP is not an insurance plan. SHIP-trained volunteer counselors can answer questions about Medicare; Medicare supplement insurance; Medicare Advantage Plans with HMOs, PPOs, PFFS; prescription drug coverage through Medicare and other sources; long-term care insurance; Medicare claims and appeals; Medicare beneficiary rights and guarantees, etc. The SHIP representative in Wheeling is available by appointment at the Wheeling Pavilion Senior Center. NEWS YOU CAN USE

Electronics Landfill Ban

Electronic waste contains toxic materials that can contaminate groundwater or present other environmental issues if not properly disposed of. Effective January 1, the disposal of electronics in landfills is prohibited by State law. Electronic waste placed at residential curbsides or in designated refuse locations will not be collected by Waste Management.

Items prohibited in landfills include but are not limited to televisions, monitors, computers, laptops, fax machines, printers, keyboards, scanners, DVD players, MP3 players, video consoles, recorders, DVRs, and digital converter boxes. These items must be recycled by a registered collector, recycler and/or manufacturer. The Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County (SWANCC) has contracted with Supply-Chain Services for a permanent drop-off location for its member communities. Wheeling residents may bring acceptable electronics, at no charge, to:

Residents may visit SWANCC at <http://www.swancc.org/index.php/programs/electronics-recycling> for a list of acceptable electronic waste items and additional permanent or one-day drop-off locations. Residents may also drop off electronics at electronic retail stores; some electronic retail stores may charge a small fee for larger electronic items. Items in good, working condition can also be donated to charitable organizations.

Wheeling Food Pantry Now Open

The Wheeling Food Pantry located at 101 N. Wolf Road has opened its doors to the public. The Food Pantry is an initiative of the Wheeling Rotary Club and is supported by several community organizations including the Village of Wheeling, OMNI Youth Services, St. Joseph the Worker Church, Wheeling High School and Wheeling School District 21. Social Services staff from Wheeling as well as from OMNI Youth Services are available during pantry hours to provide visitors with additional services as needed.

Requirements for utilizing the Food Pantry: Patrons must either be Wheeling residents or have children in School District 21 or Wheeling High School. Patrons must bring proof of residency (driver's license or other official ID, utility bill, lease, mortgage, or a letter from School District 21 or Wheeling High School). Qualifying patrons may utilize the Food Pantry once every 30 days. Donations are badly needed. The pantry is in need of non-perishable food items such as peanut butter & jelly, spaghetti noodles and sauce, tuna and tuna helper, pancake mix and syrup, oatmeal, cream of wheat, cereal, granola bars, SpaghettiOs, ravioli, rice, beans (pinto, black, or red in dried or canned form), macaroni & cheese, etc. Collection bins for these donations may be found at Village Hall, the Police Department, Wheeling Pavilion Senior Center, and Fire Station 24. Donations may also be brought directly to the pantry during regular business hours.

Social Service Outreach

The Village of Wheeling Social Services Division will be offering monthly outreach to residents of various multi-family communities at their clubhouses or common areas. Will you be a Sno Angel?

The first snowfalls of winter bring challenges for some Wheeling residents who have difficulty keeping their sidewalks clear and avoiding falls. Some of Wheeling's seniors in particular need extra help in the winter. Sno Angels is an international campaign to be good neighbors and help seniors and others in need with snow removal. All you have to do to be a Sno Angel is simply adopt a senior's driveway and sidewalk and keep it clear. Watch for people in your neighborhood who could use help and ask if you can lend a hand. If you or your community group would like to volunteer to help others even outside of your neighborhood, please contact the Wheeling Pavilion Senior Center at 847.459.2670 and ask to be part of the Sno Angel Snow Removal Program.

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An Opportunity to Seek Lower Electric Bills

In 2010, the Illinois State legislature gave municipalities a tool to help taxpayers save money. Villages are now able to seek competitive pricing for the provision of electricity to residents and small businesses. In order to seek this competitive pricing in one contract, the Village needs approval through a referendum; the Wheeling Village Board has approved the placement of this referendum question on the March 20, 2012 ballot. Citizens will be asked if the Village should have the authority to seek bids for electrical services under a single contract that would include residents and small businesses. It is believed that by combining electrical service for all individual customers into a single bid, consumers will have lower electric bills. The Village is partnering with Arlington Hts., Buffalo Grove, Lincolnshire, Long Grove, Palatine, and Vernon Hills through an inter-governmental agreement. Collectively, the communities have more than 260,000 residents. By pooling resources, we believe that we will be able to leverage greater benefits for the communities we serve.

The referendum question on the March 20, 2012 ballot specifically asks:

Shall the Village of Wheeling have the authority to arrange for the supply of electricity for its residential and small commercial retail customers who have not opted out of such program?

Vote
March 20, 2012!

The Village receives no financial benefit from this initiative. The purpose of pursuing this program is to lower electricity costs for the benefit of residents and businesses. If the referendum is approved, the Village would issue a Request for Proposal from Illinois Commerce Commission certified wholesale electric suppliers to seek proposals for this initiative. If the resulting prices are lower than current ComEd prices, the Village Board would accept the best bid. Each community would enter into their own contract for service. Since electric prices would be lower, customers' bills would decrease. It is not required that each customer participate. Any customer may opt out of the program and stay with their current electric supplier. If residents and small businesses already have a contract with an electric supplier other than ComEd, they could opt-in when their contract expires.
