



I'd like to begin by expressing my gratitude to Wheeling residents for giving me the opportunity to serve as your Village President. I was deeply honored to be sworn in on May 6 by Cook County Clerk David Orr, along with new Trustee Mary Krueger, returning Trustees Ken Brady and Bill Hein, and returning Clerk Elaine Simpson. I would like to thank my predecessor, Judy Abruscato, who served this Village well for 26 years. It is community leaders like her who have helped shape Wheeling into what it is today, and I wish her all the best in her future endeavors.

I am thrilled to announce that fireworks will once again be returning to Wheeling! Please join the Village Board as we host "An Evening Under the Stars" on Wednesday, July 3. This year's event will be held at the southeast corner of Dundee Road and Northgate Parkway. This location is the perfect spot for a picnic, so pack a meal, bring your lawnchairs, and join us at 6 p.m. to hear live music by Wheeling's own "Midnight," to be followed by the fireworks show at 9:15 p.m. We hope you can join us for this fun-filled family evening!

Fireworks were cancelled last year due to ongoing construction at Heritage Park, but I'm proud that we've found a work-around this year. We are all eagerly awaiting the complete renovation of Heritage Park into a regional athletic and recreation destination. The Village is assisting the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District and the Wheeling Park District with this much-needed flood control initiative, which will also be used to promote future redevelopment. The project will completely remake the park, with improvements including new walkways, a pavilion by the lake, a band shell, soccer fields, and baseball diamonds. Once completed, this project will be a boon to the entire community.

Commercial and industrial growth in Wheeling also continues at a steady pace. Annual retail sales in the Village increased over 6% to more than \$503 million. Recently, Starbucks Coffee signed a lease for a drive-thru store in a reconstructed outlot building in the Lexington Commons shopping center at Lake-Cook Road and Lexington Drive. Dunkin Donuts is also on track to open on Dundee Road soon. Earlier this year, Sav-A-Lot opened a 14,000 square-foot store in Dunhurst Plaza, and Bargains in A Box celebrated its opening in Lynn Plaza with a ribbon-cutting event in May. In the industrial sector, Precision Zone has begun to invest more than \$1 million to rehabilitate a vacant 72,000-square-foot facility; the project will result in the addition of 50 new jobs over the next two years. Overall industrial vacancy remains low, and construction activity continues at the airport as well, with the recent groundbreaking of the 30,000 square-foot Tin Goose hangar facility.

Finally, Wheeling continues to benefit from being home to the Korean Cultural Center of Chicago, which recently celebrated its second anniversary. We wish them many more years of success and happiness in Wheeling.

I know I speak for the entire Board when I say I'm excited to continue meeting challenges and creating opportunities to make Wheeling an even greater place to live and work.

Children's Coats Needed!



Storm Water Runoff Pollution

Storm water runoff and the pollutants it collects from streets, driveways, rooftops, etc. can enter water sources such as creeks, streams, rivers and lakes. Residents and businesses can take the following measures to prevent storm water runoff pollution from entering our water sources:

- Checking vehicles for leaks. Repair leaks and dispose of used auto fluids at designated drop-off facilities.
- Using pesticides and fertilizers sparingly. Use organic mulch or safer pest controls whenever possible.
- Composting or mulching yard waste, or following local yard waste programs. Do not sweep yard waste into storm drains.
- Sweeping litter/debris from properties—including sidewalks, driveways, and parking lots and properly disposing of it.
- Sweeping and properly disposing of construction debris (i.e. concrete and mortar).
- Cleaning up after pets. Village Municipal Code 7.10 requires cleaning up after pets on public or other's property.

Capital Improvement Projects

The following 2013 Capital Improvement Plan projects are underway or will be starting soon:

Motor Fuel Tax (MFT) Street Improvement Program: Resurfacing of Dunhurst Unit III Subdivision and resurfacing and reconstruction of Shadow Bend Subdivision.

Sidewalk Removal and Replacement Program: Completion of the work in Dunhurst Unit IV Subdivision started in 2012, and new work on various other locations throughout the Village which have been identified as needing immediate attention.

Crack Sealing Program: Provides sealing of cracks and joints in pavements of the streets in various locations throughout the Village.

Water Main Replacement Program: This year's project will include Palm Drive, Willow and Redwood Trail in the Hollywood Ridge Subdivision south of Dundee Road and east of Schoenbeck Road, and Edgewood Drive off north Milwaukee Avenue. Substantial completion of this project is slated for November.

Sewer Relining Program: Sewer relining locations will include Cedar Drive, Wilshire Drive, Pebble Drive, Woodland Drive, Palm Drive and Willow Trail in the Hollywood Ridge Subdivision, as well as Scott Street and Anthony Road in the Michael Babiarz Subdivision south of Dundee Road and east and west of Schoenbeck Road

Dundee Road Bicycle/Pedestrian Path: The project consists of a new 10-foot-wide path along the entire length of the south parkway of Dundee Road from the Des Plaines River to the I-294 Tri-State Tollway, and along the north parkway of Dundee Road from the Cook County Forest Preserve's entrance to Potawatomi Lake to Portwine Road.

Northgate Parkway Bridge Repair Project: Longitudinal joint and bridge approach repairs and placement of rip rap to reinforce the banks of the creek adjacent to the bridge to protect the bridge's footings, wing-walls and abutments. The awarded contractor has scheduled these repairs to be accomplished in July of this year.

Hazardous Household Chemicals

Household products, such as cleaners, lawn or garden care, antifreeze, pesticides, etc., contain hazardous ingredients that can be harmful to human health and the environment and require proper and safe disposal.

Drop-off facilities for hazardous waste are available to Illinois residents at no charge. These permanent facilities are located in Naperville, Rockford, Gurnee and Chicago. Village of Wheeling 2012 Annual Drinking Water Quality Report

January 1, 2012 to December 31, 2012

WHAT IS THE WATER QUALITY REPORT?

The Annual Water Quality Report, also known as the Consumer Confidence Report, is an annual report required by the Safe Drinking Water Act (SDWA). This report is intended to provide citizens with important information about the Village's drinking water and the efforts made by the water system to provide safe drinking water. The report provides facts, violations (if applicable) and contaminants identified in the water drinking supply during the calendar year of January 1, 2012 through December 31, 2012.

The Village of Wheeling is committed to providing all consumers with safe and reliable drinking water. The Village of Wheeling is happy to announce that **no** violations were recorded for 2012 regarding monitoring, reporting, treatment technique, maximum residual disinfectant level, or maximum contaminant level. SOURCE WATER INFORMATION

The source of drinking water used by the Village of Wheeling is purchased surface water. The Village of Wheeling receives water from Lake Michigan through the Northwest Water Commission (NWWC), which in turn receives water from the City of Evanston that utilizes three water cribs, or intakes, located over a mile offshore in Lake Michigan. The City of Evanston pumps and treats the lake water at their treatment plant. The plant provides the following treatment processes: coagulation/flocculation, sedimentation, filtration, and disinfection. The water is then transported to the NWWC through a 60-inch transmission main to a 25 million gallon reservoir at the NWWC main pumping station. From there, water is pumped into the Village of Wheeling's three receiving stations.

SOURCES OF DRINKING WATER

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in water include:

- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which can come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife;
- Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which may be naturally occurring or result from urban storm water run-off, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming;
- Pesticides/herbicides which may come from sources such as agriculture, urban storm water run-off and residential uses;
- Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban storm water run-off and septic systems;
- Radioactive contaminants which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Safe Drinking Water Hotline at (800) 426-4791.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protections for public health.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by *Cryptosporidium* and other microbial contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. We cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. Information on lead in drinking water, testing methods, and steps you can take to minimize exposure is available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline or at <http://www.epa.gov/safewater/lead>.

SOURCE WATER ASSESSMENTS

Wheeling wants customers to be informed about their water quality. The public is welcome to attend Village Board meetings where decisions that affect drinking water quality are made. The Village Board meets every first and third Monday of the month at 6:30 PM at Village Hall, 2 Community Boulevard, Wheeling, IL 60090. The source water assessment for the Village's supply has been completed by the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA). If you would like a copy of this information, please contact our Utility Superintendent at (847) 279-6928. The Illinois EPA considers all surface water sources of community water to be susceptible to pollution. The nature of surface water allows contaminants to migrate into the intakes with no protection, only dilution, which is the reason for mandatory treatment for all surface water supplies in Illinois. All three of Evanston's intakes are located far enough offshore that shoreline impacts are not considered a factor. However, at certain times of the year contamination potential exists due to the proximity of the North Shore Channel and wet-weather flows. The proximity to a major shipping lane adds to the susceptibility of these three intakes.

DEFINITIONS: The following tables contain scientific terms and measures, some of which may require explanation.

- Action Level Goal:** The level of contaminant at which there is no known or expected risk to health.
- Action Level or AL:** The level of contaminant which triggers treatment or other requirements a water system must follow.
- Avg:** Regulatory compliance with some MCLs are based on running annual average of monthly samples.
- Maximum Contaminant Level or MCL:** The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.
- Maximum Contaminant Level Goal or MCLG:** The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.
- Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level or MRDL:** The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.
- Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level Goal or MRDLG:** The level of disinfectant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs allow for a margin of safety.
- mrem/year:** millirems per year (a measure of radiation absorbed by the body)
- N/A:** Not applicable.
- NTU:** Nephelometric turbidity units.
- pCi/L:** picocuries per liter (a measure of radioactivity)
- ppb:** Micrograms per liter or parts per billion – or one ounce in 7,350,000 gallons of water.
- ppm:** Milligrams per liter or parts per million – or one ounce in 7,350 gallons of water.
- Treatment Technique or TT:** A required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

NOTE: *The state requires monitoring of certain contaminants less than once per year because the concentrations of these contaminants do not change frequently. Therefore, some of the data may be more than one year old.*

WATER METER REPLACEMENT PROGRAM

The Village of Wheeling is currently implementing a Village-wide water meter upgrade program to replace existing water meters and remote readers with a new Fixed Base Automatic Meter Reading System in all residential, commercial and industrial areas. The new meter reading system will improve service to all Village customers by providing more efficient monitoring of water consumption as well as other customer service enhancements.

On January 4, 2011, the Reduction of Lead in Drinking Water Act was passed, which amended the Safe Drinking Water Act (SDWA). The SDWA mandates the wetted surfaces of products in contact with drinking water to have a 0.25% maximum lead content. The legislation goes into effect on January 4, 2014. The Village's new meters comply with this new legislation.



Safe Babies, Safe Place, Safe Haven



Please remember that in Illinois, a parent who cannot care for their newborn baby, up to 30 days old, can legally give the unharmed infant to a staff member at a staffed fire station, police station, hospital, or emergency care facility and walk away—no questions asked. No one will ask your name. Your baby will get medical care and be placed for adoption into a loving family. You can even provide anonymous medical information so your baby will grow up with a medical history. A packet of information is given to the parent, and the baby is transported to a hospital for a check-up and placed with a pre-approved adoption agency. If you or anyone you know is pregnant and does not feel like they have any options, please call either a crisis counselor at the Save Abandoned Babies Foundation at 888.510.BABY or a Wheeling Social Worker at 847.459.2606. Summer Safety Tips

Each season brings its own unique types of emergencies that require the assistance of public safety departments. By following a few minor safety tips, you can reduce the likelihood of emergencies at your home this summer.

- Keep children and pets away from barbecue grills when in use.
- Never pour lighter fluid onto already ignited charcoal briquettes. This can cause the lighter fluid to immediately ignite back, resulting in life-threatening burns.
- Leave fireworks to the professionals. Improperly used fireworks can cause serious injuries or death, as well as cause a fire at your home or a neighbor's home. Sparklers burn at more than 1,000 degrees Fahrenheit, the same temperature that makes steel melt. In addition, fireworks are illegal in the Village of Wheeling.
- Allow lawnmowers and gasoline-powered lawn equipment to "cool down" before refueling them. Gasoline that is accidentally spilled on a hot motor can cause a flash fire resulting in serious injuries or death.
- When painting your house and using ladders or paint-roller extension poles, make sure to check your surroundings before starting. Watch out for overhead electrical wires which can energize these items if they accidentally come into contact.
- When working on a ladder, take the time to make sure it is setup on level ground, and if possible have someone hold or stabilize the ladder while you are on top. A fall of only a few feet can result in a broken arm, neck, or worse.
- Make sure to drink plenty of water throughout the day and increase water intake if you are physically engaged in work or play.
- When driving in residential neighborhoods, slow down and be prepared to come to an immediate stop. Children will be out playing and can suddenly dart out into the street on a bicycle or when chasing a ball or a toy.
- Keep an eye on the weather when planning your daily activities. Warm temperatures and high humidity can cause thunderstorms to develop quickly. Sometimes these storms can be severe, resulting in lightning, high winds, and even tornados.
- After a severe storm, do not let children or pets outdoors until you have checked your home and yard for storm damage. If you lose electrical power, there may be a nearby energized power line lying on the ground, or across nearby buildings, fences, and vehicles. If you lose electrical power, do not call the Village, but instead call ComEd at 1-800-EDISON1.

Finally, if an accident does occur, immediately call 9-1-1 from either your home telephone or cellular telephone.



Uniform Do-Not-Resuscitate (DNR) Advance Directive

What you and your family need to know

Honoring the wishes of a dying loved one is important, but sometimes dying wishes are not always shared with other family members, or have not been properly communicated to nursing home staff or other concerned members. Therefore, it is critical that individuals have a properly completed "Uniform Do-Not-Resuscitate (DNR) Advance Directive – Physician Orders for Life-Sustaining Treatment (POLST)" form by their bedside to avoid such confusion. This form clarifies what actions, if any, the dying individual wants to occur should they become incapacitated and in need of life-sustaining interventions.

If paramedics are called to the individual's bedside and no completed "Uniform Do-Not-Resuscitate (DNR) Advance Directive – Physician Orders for Life-Sustaining Treatment (POLST)" is present, the paramedics are legally obligated to initiate life-sustaining measures and transport the individual to a nearby hospital. With a completed form, the paramedics will confirm that the individual has passed away and then release the individual's body to the next of kin. With some careful planning, one's end of life can be made somewhat less stressful for all concerned.
