WELCOME TO WHEELING

State of the Village Address

This address will be given by President Horcher during the Chamber of Commerce's State of the Village event to be held on March 28, 2019.

As we approach Wheeling's 125th anniversary on June 22, 2019, I'm honored to provide an update on the state of the Village. The past year was an eventful one, a trend that's certain to continue over the coming months.

For everyone who travels on Dundee Road, the progress of development has been hard to miss. Construction of the Wheeling Town Center is substantially complete, with apartment occupancy anticipated in the spring; commercial spaces are also filling quickly, with Inland Bank, The Learning Experience, and restaurants Mia's Cantina, Meat & Potatoes Eatery, and Eggsperience Café joining previously-announced tenants Starbucks, City Works, and CMX Theater. Immediately to the northwest, construction of Uptown 500 is advancing rapidly following a redevelopment agreement with the Village; the project will bring 321 apartments and 10,500 square feet of retail space to the vicinity of the Metra station. These new residents will enjoy amenities including the Wheeling Park District's expanded Community Recreation Center, a project the Village has been able to assist with \$1.8 million in tax increment financing. West along the Dundee corridor, Wingspan Development closed late last year on the sale of Dundee Plaza and the vacant land next to Jack London Middle School, and plans to redevelop the site with townhomes and retail space. These projects follow the construction of the Northgate Crossing apartments and townhomes, and the substantial completion of the Whitley of Wheeling assisted-living facility.

With such significant changes underway, the Village has taken steps to update its Station Area Master Plan, a component of our Comprehensive Plan that guides development, zoning, and infrastructure improvements near the Metra station. Since its adoption in 2004, the Station Area Plan has played a critical role in our decision-making, prompting a complex series of mostly-invisible preparations that enabled the transformation of the Dundee corridor. Much has changed in the last fifteen years, in the station area and in the broader world, where the growth of technologies such as smartphones, social media, and e-commerce has radically changed our behavior as consumers; this in turn has affected municipal sales tax revenues and expectations about the viability of brick-and-mortar retailers. As always, the Village seeks to encourage development that works in the long term for both its investors and our residents; the updated plan will improve our ability to do so.

One aspect of the Station Area Master Plan that remains unchanged is its emphasis on transit-oriented mixed-use development: the construction of high-quality, high-density housing that provides easy pedestrian and bicycle access to regional mass transit and a wealth of options for shopping, dining, entertainment, and recreation. Such development will result in the gradual relocation of industrial uses, a process that is already underway with Builders Asphalt's recent move farther south. The Village remains strongly committed to maintaining the health of our thriving industrial sector, the fifth-largest concentration of manufacturing employment in Illinois. Over the past year we've seen tenants begin to occupy both the 84,000-square-foot Chaddick Industrial Center and the 181,000-square-foot Wheeling Distribution Center—the first two speculative industrial developments to be built in Wheeling in decades—as well as substantial renovation or expansion at existing facilities, including the 111,000-square-foot addition to Wieland Metals at Northgate Parkway and Lake Cook Road. The Village looks forward to productive discussions about other pending industrial developments such as the Pace Suburban Bus Service's plan to move its Northwest Transit Operations Center to the former Allstate site on South Wolf Road and Panattoni Development's proposed 163,000-square-foot spec building across Wolf from Chicago Executive Airport.

The Village will continue to promote industrial and commercial growth near the airport, and looks forward to the completion of the airport's updated Master Plan later this year, which will assist us in our efforts to maximize its value for—and minimize its negative impact on—Wheeling residents. The nearly \$20 million in capital projects the Village has planned for 2019 includes significant water and sewer improvements near the airport, as well as the complete reconstruction of Fire Station 23, additional stormwater control on Wheeling Road, and the commencement of major construction on Wolf and Lake Cook Roads. We'll continue to provide updates on these projects as appropriate. *Continued on next page...*

I'll close by paying tribute to former Village President Judy Abruscato, whose passing on December 28 brought an end to decades of devoted service to Wheeling. In addition to her tenure as a Village official—which included 22 years as a trustee—Judy was a tireless volunteer for organizations such as Wheeling High School, the Rotary Club, the Garden Club, the Historical Society, and the Senior Foundation, among others. She always demonstrated exemplary citizenship and pride in her community, and she will be greatly missed as we celebrate this milestone anniversary year.

Online Police Reporting Now Available

The Wheeling Police Department is proud to introduce online web-based reporting for certain incidents. Online reporting allows you to quickly and easily file minor incident reports without having to wait for a police officer to be dispatched. Non-emergency crime reports consist of incidents that have occurred in the past and require the documentation of a police report to meet a personal need or a business process, such as a report for a financial institution or insurance company. The following incidents can be reported online:

- Vandalism
- Harassment (if suspect is not known)
- Theft
- Fraud
- Lost property or other minor incidents for documentation purposes only



Please confirm the following to find out if online citizen police report filing is right for you:

- This is not an emergency
- This incident occurred within the Village of Wheeling, except for identity theft, which can be filed online provided you are a resident of Wheeling.
- You do not know the identity of the suspect(s) who may have committed the crime.

To file a report online, please go to the “Police Department” page on the Village’s website and click on “File a Police Report Online.” You can also access the system directly by typing www.wheelingil.gov/751/File-a-Police-Report-Online into your browser. You must have an email address and provide the same identifying information (name, address, telephone number, etc.) as if you were filing a report with an officer. If the incident you wish to report is an emergency, if the crime is in progress, or if you simply wish to speak to an officer in person, please dial 9-1-1.

Protect Yourself Against Ransomware

Ransomware is one of the most serious online threats facing people and businesses today. How does ransomware work? Hackers hold your files hostage—often encrypting them—then demand payment, typically in bitcoins, for you to get them back.

Here are some tips to protect your devices from ransomware, and what to do if you’re a victim.

- **Update your software.** Use anti-virus software and keep it up to date. Set your operating system, web browser, and security software to update automatically on your computer. On mobile devices, you may have to do this manually. If your software is out-of-date, it’s easier for criminals to sneak bad stuff onto your device.
- **Think twice before clicking on links or downloading attachments and apps.** According to one panelist, 91% of ransomware is downloaded through phishing emails. You also can get ransomware from a compromised site or through malicious online ads.
- **Back up your important files.** From tax forms to family photos, make it part of your routine to back up files on your computers and mobile devices often. When you’re done, log out of the cloud and unplug external hard drives so hackers can’t encrypt and lock your back-ups, too.


What if I’m a victim of ransomware?

- **Contain the attack.** Disconnect infected devices from your network to keep ransomware from spreading.
- **Restore your computer.** If you’ve backed up your files and removed any malware, you may be able to restore your computer. Follow the instructions from your operating system to reboot your computer if possible.
- **Contact law enforcement.** Report attacks to the Internet Crime Complaint Center or an FBI field office. Include any contact information (like the criminal’s email address) or payment information (like a bitcoin wallet number).

Should I pay the ransom?

Law enforcement doesn’t recommend paying the ransom, although it’s up to you whether the risks and costs of paying are worth the possibility of getting your files back. If you pay, there’s no guarantee you’ll get your files back. In fact, agreeing to pay signals to criminals that you haven’t backed up your files. Knowing this, they may increase the ransom price, and delete or deny access to your files anyway. Even if you do get your files back, they may be corrupted. And you might be a target for other scams.

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Stormwater Runoff Pollution

Stormwater runoff is generated when precipitation from rain and snowmelt flows over land or impervious surfaces and does not percolate into the ground. Stormwater runoff that flows over impervious surfaces such as streets, drive-



ways, concrete areas, and rooftops collects debris, chemicals, sediments, and other pollutants that enter the storm sewer system. The Village storm sewer effluent flows directly into detention basins, creeks, streams, rivers, and lakes, bypassing the partial cleaning typically performed at sanitary sewer treatment plants.

Pollutants that exist in stormwater runoff can include motor oil, antifreeze/transmission fluid, paint, solvents/degreasers, detergents, pet and yard waste, dirt and gravel, trash, pesticides, and fertilizers. Public Works personnel constantly extract some of this waste out of the system for efficient flow. Residents and businesses can take measures to prevent stormwater runoff pollution from entering our storm sewer system, such as:

- Repair vehicle leaks and dispose of used auto fluids at designated drop-off facilities.
- Apply pesticides and fertilizers only as necessary; use organic mulch and reduce application of outside pest controls whenever possible.
- Compost and/or mulch yard waste, and follow local yard waste programs. Do not deposit or leave yard waste in the street.
- Remove and properly dispose of litter and debris from properties, including sidewalks, driveways, and parking lots.
- Remove and properly dispose of construction debris.
- Clean up after pets. Village Municipal Code 7.10 requires removal of pet waste on public and private property.

What is Arbor Day?

Arbor Day is an annual celebration of the function trees have in our daily lives, and also promotes tree planting and care. It is celebrated in Illinois on the last Friday in April. This year, Arbor Day will occur on Friday, April 26. The Village of Wheeling has received the Tree City USA recognition—which acknowledges the Village's forestry program—for 29 consecutive years. By celebrating Arbor Day, the Village continues to demonstrate the importance of trees in our community and acknowledges the efforts of the Village's forestry program.

Earth Day

Earth Day is recognized annually on April 22. Protecting our environment (air, land, and water) and creating a more sustainable future is an everyday effort. There are simple ways we can contribute to protecting our environment and observing Earth Day every day.

- Replace incandescent bulbs with Compact Fluorescent Light (CFL) or Light Emitting Diode (LED) bulbs. CFLs and LEDs save money, use less energy, last longer, and lower greenhouse gas emissions.
- Turn off lights when not in a room, and unplug certain appliances (such as computers, laptops, televisions, coffee makers, and toasters) when not in use. Use of a power strip allows multiple items to be turned off simultaneously, saving energy and energy costs.
- Fixing leaky faucets and toilets reduces water consumption and lowers water costs.
- Use ecologically friendly cleaning products. Commercial cleaning solutions often contain chemicals that take longer to biodegrade, polluting the environment after disposal, ending up in streams and rivers.
- Reduce plastic such as shopping bags and water bottles, and instead use re-useable grocery bags and refillable water bottles and coffee mugs, and use a container instead of disposable sandwich bags. Plastics are non-biodegradable, and can release chemicals when in landfills, polluting waterways and threatening wildlife.
- Support local growers by visiting farmers markets. Local growers travel less to sell their products, reducing the carbon footprint caused by transportation emissions. These growers also utilize methods that create less of an environmental impact.

Floods Are No Myth: Be Prepared for the Unexpected

Discounts on flood insurance are just one of many benefits residents enjoy as a result of Wheeling's proactive approach to flood hazard damage reduction. A 41-year member of the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), Wheeling has joined a national effort to minimize property damage in cases of flooding and provide affordable flood insurance to all homeowners, whether or not they are located in or near a floodplain. As part of its NFIP commitment, the Village provides a range of information on flooding potential, prevention, safety, and other issues. For more information about the NFIP and flood insurance, call 1.800.427.4661. Copies of the Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRMs) can be reviewed at the Village Hall and Indian Trails Public Library.

Local Flood Hazard Potential

The Village's proximity to waterways such as the Des Plaines River, Buffalo Creek, and McDonald Creek raises the hazard of flooding during heavy rains. Standard homeowner's insurance does not cover flooding. Through the 1960s, private rates on flood insurance were prohibitively high, which made it almost impossible to carry flood insurance. The NFIP, formed in 1968, is designed to subsidize the cost of flood insurance to member communities, qualify them to receive disaster relief, and establish minimum national standards to reduce flood losses.

High CRS Rating

One of eight inaugural NFIP communities in Illinois, Wheeling designed programs to exceed minimum standards and optimize benefits to Village residents. In 1992, the NFIP implemented the Community Rating System (CRS) to reward communities that go above and beyond the basic requirements. Effective May 1, 2014, our rating was upgraded to Class 6, which provides a 20% discount on flood insurance policies for properties located within the special flood hazard area. Policies issued for properties outside the special flood hazard area continue to receive a 5% discount. Wheeling continues to be proactive in preventative initiatives, including:

Stream maintenance: Regular inspections of waterways to ensure they are clear of debris and potential obstructions.

Regulating new construction: New buildings in the flood zone must meet requirements for elevation and flood-proofing. Village planners ensure that new developments don't increase flood risk for neighbors in the community.

Keeping residents informed of flood risk and how to minimize impact: Our residents must be aware of the potential for flooding. Tools such as this newsletter enable us to keep residents informed regarding the risk of flooding.

Development Regulated

Development of any type within special flood hazard areas is strictly regulated. In order to construct a building or an addition, perform any grading, or fill any other type of construction in these

areas, an individual must obtain a special "floodplain development permit." This permit is issued in conjunction with other construction permits to assure that the new construction will not be susceptible to flood damage or cause increased flood damage potential to neighboring properties. Floodplain development regulations can be found on the Village's website at www.wheelingil.gov in Title 22 of the Municipal Code (a link to which can be found on the home page) or by contacting the Engineering Division at 847.279.6910.

With flooding a possibility, especially during the spring/summer season, preparation is the best defense. Safeguarding people, protecting buildings, and purchasing flood insurance are keys to defending against floods.

Protect Your Property: To flood-proof a structure, start by elevating or relocating electrical panel boxes, furnaces, water heaters, and washer/dryers to areas least likely to be flooded. Install basement floor drains and interior and exterior backwater valves. Consider erecting interior flood walls around utilities. Move essential items and furniture to the upper floors of your home. Keep materials such as sandbags, plywood, plastic sheeting, and lumber handy for emergency waterproofing. More flood protection information is available from FEMA through the "Floodplain/Flooding Information" link on the home page of our website at www.wheelingil.gov. Information is also available for review at the Indian Trails Public Library.

Personal Safety: During periods of high water, stay out of the basement where breaker boxes and electrical wiring present the risk of shock. If you know high water is imminent, shut off the electricity, gas, and water. Keep your family together and make sure everyone has identification. Move everyone—including pets—to high ground. Rescue crews cannot reach you once the water becomes two feet deep. Don't drive across flooded roads where your vehicle could stall. Flowing water above your knees can generate dangerous currents; avoid walking through it.

Village Monitors Rising Water Levels: The Village monitors rising water levels with strategically placed gauges. Comparing data with historic records, the Village can predict areas of potential flooding. In the event of a flooding situation, Village staff is mobilized to notify people in affected areas. In some situations, notification may be made by phone. Road closure information is available from radio stations.

Yard Waste Collections



Yard waste collections begin on April 1 and continue through November 30 on your regularly-scheduled collection days. Townhouses and condominiums do not have this service.

- Yard waste must be placed in paper bags or in a container clearly marked with a red X (cannot be in plastic bags or cardboard boxes). Bags and containers must not be larger than 32 gallons or exceed 50 pounds. There is no limit to the number of bags or containers.

- All yard waste must be placed at the curb by 6 a.m. the day of collection, but not before 5 p.m. the evening before.

- Brush must be bundled and tied with twine or string. Bundles must not weigh over 50 pounds, exceed four feet in length or two feet in diameter, or contain limbs greater than three inches in diameter. There is no limit to the number of brush bundles.



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




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
